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SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY SUMMER SESSION June 6 to July 13, 1932

Registration: Monday and Tuesday, June 6 and 7, 1932.

The Summer Session of Southern University will begin Wednesday, June 8, and close July 13, 1932.

Recitations will be held six days a week so that six weeks' work may be done in five weeks of time.

Those who may expect to earn college credit will be required to attend recitations the full five weeks (30 days). Those who may desire to earn college credit will be, as a general rule limited to three courses.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Persons who may wish to attend the Summer Session of Southsern University must furnish proof that they hold a teacher's certificate issued by the State Board of Education of Louisiana, or its equivalent from some other state; and that they are prepared to do work of college grade.

REQUIREMENTS FOR REGISTRATION

Those who may desire to attend the Summer Session of Southern University should write to one of the following:— The President; the Director, or the Registrar—for an application blank. The blank should be read very carefully, then filled out and returned.

Small extra charges will be made for instrumental music. All expenses must be paid in advance at the beginning of the Summer Session. No deduction will be made for late entrance, or for those who may leave the Institution before the end of the session for which they may be registered.

THE DORMITORIES

The dormitories will be ready for occupancy Monday morning, June 6th. The Parker Dining Hall will be opened for the students of the Summer Session Sunday evening at six o'clock, June 5th.

All persons who may arrive on the University campus earlier than this date may arrange for their meals in the University Cafe.

LOCATION

Southern University is located at Scotlandville, La., about five miles north of Baton Rouge, La. The University is very easily accessible. It is near the intersection of the L. and A., and the Y. and M. V. railroads. Taxi accommodation may be secured at the station.

REGULATIONS

The Summer Session is a part of the regular school-year. Alt persons who enroll as students of the Summer Session will be expected to conform to the rules and regulations of the University. Students of the Summer session will be required to furnish their own bedding and towels (three sheets, three pillow cases, one spread, eight towels). A light weight blanket may be needed. Students should bring the necessary bedding in a suit case, as a trunk may be delayed in delivery.

All of the dormitories will-be closed every night at ten-thirty o'clock; except on Saturday and Sunday nights, when they will be locked at ten forty-five o'clock. Students and student-teachers will not be expected to remain out of the domitories later than that time, unless they will have obtained special permission from the person in charge of the dormitory in which they live. The lights will be extinguished at ten forty-five o'clock, at which time all students will be expected to retire.

The Institution has a laundry with steam equipment. It is oper-

ated by an expert, assisted by well trained help. Therefore, students will not be allowed to do their own laundry work in the laundry. No laundering will be allowed in the dormitories. The use of electric irons in the dormitories will not be allowed. The necessary arrangements for pressing will be made, therefore, no pressing will be permitted in the dormitories.

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY SUMMER SESSION

There will not be any room in the dormitories for children. It will not be possible to accommodate man and wife by allowing them to occupy the same room in a dormitory.

All persons who attend the Summer Session will be required to report promptly and regularly to all school exercises.

Students will be held responsible for the proper care of their rooms, which should be kept ready for official inspection at any time.

BUILDINGS

There are twenty-five permanent buildings on the campus; twelve cottages for teachers; and a residence for the President.

THE SUMMER SESSION LITERARY SOCIETY

Literary and musical entertainments will be rendered in the University auditorium every Friday evening, at seven-thirty o'clock, by the Summer Session students. The first Friday evening of the Summer session the members of the Summer Session will organize the Literary Society which will be under their control and supervision very largely.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Students of the Summer Session will have an opportunity to attend the church of their choice in Baton Rouge, and in Scotlandville; both of which places are within convenient distances from the University. However, Sunday School services will be held at the University in the auditorium every Sunday morning at eleven o'clock. Sunday evening services will be held in the University auditorium every Sunday at seven-thirty o'clock; at which time the President, some member of the Faculty, or invited speaker will deliver the regular weekly address.

EDUCATIONAL PILGRIMAGES

Opportunities will be given to the students of the Summer Session to visit the State Capitol; the Standard Oil Refinery; the Baton Rouge Air Port; and other places of interest from time to time. Opportunity will be given students to visit the new \$5,000,000 State Capitol.

FORMATION OF CLASSES

Classes will be formed for any of the courses provided for in the Summer Session Bulletin upon the application of ten or more persons who are eligible to pursue such courses.

Certificate of Credit

A certificate of credit recognized by the Louisiana State Board of Education will be issued at the close of the Summer Session.

Courses numbering from 111 and above, will be recognized by the Institution toward graduation from one of its college curricula.

CREDIT

Three quarter-hours of college credit will be given for each course of college grade. In order to give credit just mentioned it will be absolutely necessary to require a considerable amount of extra work outside of the class rooms (in the library; in the laboratories; or in the shops). We hope by this method to compensate for six extra days of recitations which ordinarily would be required to make the thirty-six (36) one hour recitations.

MECHANIC ARTS

PRINTING: The course offered in General Printing will give a summary of the various branches and treat the connection of the subject with academic work. Actual practice will be given in the making of tablets, notebooks, folios. Book binding and book mending as far as its usefulness to the rural and city teacher will be practiced during the course.

Special courses in Linotype Operation and Press Work.

AGRICULTURAL ENGINEERING: Blacksmithing, Farm Shop-Work and Miscellaneous Farm Repairs make up this course. Practical applications are made in every course. A study of the construction and operation of modern farm machinery is executed.

TAILORING: Actual Practice in the making of Coat Suits; Making of Spring and Winter Coats; Making of Tailored Dresses; Designing and Drafting Patterns.

MUSIC

PUBLIC SCHOOL (11)—Credit, 1 quarter-hour.

The requirements of music, ear training, key signatures, (sharps and flats); the diatonic major scales in sharps and flats, sight singing in keys of 1, 2, 3 sharps and flats).

PUBLIC SCHOOL (112)-Credit, 1 quarter-hour.

A continuation of (111). Sight singing in all of the major keys, a study of the various time signatures, rythmic forms, building of chromatic major scales in all keys.

PUBLIC SCHOOL (113)—Credit 1 quarter-hour.

The subject matter of music in the Kindergarten and the primary grades; tone matching; ear training; rythmic development; rote songs; singing games; dramatic songs.

INSTRUMENTAL: Courses will be offered in the study of the violin, piano, voice culture, saxophone, cornet, clarinet, or any orchestral instrument. Private half-hour lessons per week for five weeks:—\$2.50.
